Purpose of Torah Corps

Torah Corps is an elevated preparation program of individual and communal study preparing students for Bar or Bat Mitzvah, as well as planting firm roots for lifeling Jewish learning and leading healthy Jewish lives.

Goals of Torah Corps - Preparing for *Bar/Bat Mitzvah* through:

- Taking responsibility for oneself and work
- Experiencing varied learning modalities
- Sharing group objectives
- Creating Community
- Developing important Jewish life skills

Torah Corps Class Design

- Chevruta- style learning environment
 - Students study together in supportive cohort together, grouped around date of B'nai Mitzvah.
- Cantor/Rabbi/Youth Educator are Mentors and teachers
 - Teen Madrichim help to facilitate and support one-on-one learning, guiding peer learning as well as encouragement.
- Variety of learning modes
- Torah Corps begins approximately a year before B'nai Mitzvah.
 - Built into Kehillat Limmud day, during Chalutzim program
 - Students commit to ongoing practicing and maintaining their knowledge and skills
 - Journey and time accommodate normal amount of absence for vacation, illness, and even summer camp!
 - Learning continues through the summer prior to B'nai Mitzvah.

Torah Corps Class Content

- tst 2 months:
 - Month 1: Orientation and Prayer assessment and practice
 - Month 2: Introduction to Torah Cantillation (trope)
- Ongoing Practice of individual assignments
- Practice leading prayers
- Jewish ritual and sanctuary skills
- Monitoring of student progress
 - Occasional Individual sessions with Cantor as needed and determined by Cantor.
- Weekly, individual assignments are given to each student for them to keep up
- · Deciphering meanings of Torah text Jewish study is a prism for living
 - Students choose the particular focus from within their Torah portion
 - Sharing with each other messages from the meanings of their Torah portions
- Discussions around developing Jewish identity
- MitzvahMatters!

MitzvahMatters!

- Relevance of Jewish prophetic texts
 - High stakes for how we act in the world
 - Connect with God, with each other and with the best part of ourselves
 - Bring meaning from our ancient teachings to our lives
- Doing mitzvot
 - Connecting sacred acts with important Jewish values from The Prophets
- Passage of Haftarah assigned will connect directly with the mitzvah value that the student chooses
 - Nine mitzvah values student will choose one for focus
 - Chosen mitzvah value becomes the focus of three actions/activities in which student will engage
- Student gives short, spoken introduction to Haftarah about this work at the Shabbat service when student becomes Bar/Bat Mitzvah



Torah Corps begins KL in the year prior to B'nai Mitzvah

Conversations about doing mitzvot and Jewish identity- ongoing in Chalutzim

Orientation, prayer assessment and review, and Trope lessons - 1st 2 months [Prayer review continues throughout, at home and in class]

Learning Torah Portion

Check-in Meeting with Cantor Caro 6 months before B'nai Mitzvah -conversation about doing mitzvot and assignment of Haftarah based on MitzvahMatters!

Learning Haftarah Portion by 2-3 months out/continue Torah and prayer practice

Meeting with Rabbi Holzman

D'var Torah - work with one of the rabbis.

Write about *Mitzvah* work
